Course Description

The second-half of a one-year introduction to the Christian practice of spiritual direction. Enrolling in this class is contingent on completing Spiritual Direction I. The course will continue instruction on the historical practice of spiritual direction and engage in group spiritual formation over three weekend (Friday and Saturday) cohort gatherings (at total of five counting Spiritual Direction I. Spiritual direction is the ancient Christian practice of listening to God with another person. Students will both receive spiritual direction and practice directing two volunteer directees over the course. Students will also practice group and individual spiritual formation both in the cohort gatherings and as assignments to be completed outside of cohort gatherings.

Course Outcomes

- Knowledge of the history and practice of spiritual direction
- Become familiar with the basics of spiritual direction
- Experience group spiritual formation with fellow cohort members
- Develop a weekly spiritual rhythm
- Learn the ethical responsibilities and boundaries of one offering spiritual direction
- Become comfortable in the practices of silence, solitude, and slowing

Course Requirements

- This is a pass/fail course. Therefore all work must be turned in and of a satisfactory nature in order to receive a passing grade.
- Attend and fully participate in each cohort. This is an essential element of cohort style learning, therefore absences are extremely discouraged. A student may miss one cohort of the five cohorts for Spiritual Direction I and II under emergency circumstances (to be determined by the professor) and still receive a passing grade.
- All students must meet with a spiritual director (approved by the instructor) monthly throughout the length of the course.
- Students must continue meeting with their two directees for a total of six combined meetings.
- Students must submit monthly reports in the Cohort's Facebook group.
- Students will engage in an assigned daily spiritual practice and explore this experience with the their cohort.
- Students will complete two verbatim and meet with an approved facilitator for feedback
- Students must arrive at each cohort prepared to engage the assigned readings.

Academic Integrity

Academic dishonesty in all its forms is inconsistent with Christian faith and practice, and will result in penalties which could include a failing grade for the assignment, a failing grade for the course, dismissal from the course, and even dismissal from the school.

Credit Hour Workload

For every course credit hour, the typical student should expect to spend at least three clock hours per week of concentrated attention on course-related work, including but not limited to time attending class, as well as out-of-class time spent reading, reviewing, organizing notes, preparing for upcoming quizzes/exams, problem solving, developing and completing projects, and other activities that enhance learning. Thus, for a three-hour course, a typical student should expect to spend at least nine hours per week dedicated to the course.

Class Format

As mentioned earlier, this class will be conducted using learning cohorts. This class is designed to be taken second in the sequence of Spiritual Direction I, II, III, and IV. Students enrolling in Spiritual Direction II will be accepted contingent upon finishing Spiritual Direction I. The first year of spiritual direction training is excellent for sharpening pastoral counseling and listening skills as well as learning the fundamentals of healthy spiritual rhythms and self-care. Spiritual Direction III and IV should be taken by anyone desiring to offer formal spiritual direction.

Each cohort meeting will involve instruction in spiritual direction, spiritual formation and Christian spirituality. Each cohort will involve discussion of assignments and reading material. Each day the cohorts meet will open with a group spiritual contemplative exercise. The exercises used are for both the groups formation and to introduce students to classic forms of Christian spiritual practices.
